

BROUGHTON-IN-FURNESS,

ANGERTON, BECKSIDE, CHAPPELS, DUNNERDALE, FOXFIELD, GRIZEBECK, HEATHWAITE,
IRKBY-IRELETH, SANDSIDE, SEATHWAITE, SOUTERGATE, AND WOODLAND.

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BROUGHTON-IN-FURNESS (or West Broughton) is a small market town and parish, with a station on the Furness railway, 270 miles from London, 12 north-west by road from Ulverston and 15 by rail, 13 north from Furness Abbey, 15 from Pier pier steamboat and railway station, 40 north-west from Lancaster, 85 north from Liverpool, 85 north-west from Manchester, in the North Lonsdale division of the county, North Lonsdale petty sessional division, Lonsdale hundred (north of the Sands), Ulverston union and county court district, rural deanery of Ulverston, archdeaconry of Furness and Diocese of Carlisle. The town is about three-quarters of a mile east of the river Duddon, which separates this county from Cumberland, and about half a mile from the extreme point of the Duddon Sands, on the slope of a gentle eminence and has a southern aspect. The church of St. Mary Magdalene, situated outside the town on the site of the old

edifice, is an ancient building of stone in the Norman style, incorporating remains of reputed Saxon work, and consists of chancel, nave, south aisle with porch, and an embattled western tower, with pinnacles, containing one bell: there are eight stained windows to the Latham and Rawlinson families and a mural monument of black marble, dated 1793, to the Rev. J. Gilpin, formerly minister of this church; there also remains a beautiful Early Norman doorway. The registers date from the year 1662. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, including 4 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of five trustees, and held since 1870 by the Rev. Frederic Amable Mallett M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin, and surrogate. A small church costing 140 was erected at Dunnerdale, in this parish, in 1887. There is a Wesleyan chapel erected in 1875 by the late Nathaniel Caine esq. A sum of about £40 a year, arising from the rent of a house and cottage in the square, left by the late Miss Agnes Dixon, and other

small sums are distributed yearly to the poor. In the market place, in the centre of the town, is an obelisk, standing on a square base, and erected in the year 1810, the 50th year of the reign of George III. A weekly market is held on Wednesday and auction sales of cattle on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday in each month, and three annual fairs, April 27th, August 1st and 6th October, principally for horned cattle and mountain sheep: with other fairs for the hiring of servants. The scenery throughout the vale of Duddon (celebrated by the poet Wordsworth) is very beautiful. At Heathwaite Fells, 4 miles east, are carns and some early British remains. Broughton Tower, the seat and property of Mrs. Sawrey-Cookson, who is lady of the manor and the chief landowner, is a spacious mansion delightfully situated on an eminence commanding extensive views of the sea and the neighbouring mountains: the central portion of the mansion is very ancient, but the wings were added in 1882-3, by the late James Sawrey-Cookson; in the 16th century it was held by Sir Thomas Broughton, made a knight banneret in 1482: some of the walls are quite 8ft. in thickness, and in the old part of the tower is a narrow stone spiral staircase of 99 steps. Ecclelriggs is the seat of Viscount Cross G.C.B. The vicinity abounds in woods, consisting of ash, oak, hazel and alder, periodically furnishing material for conversion into hoops, brush stocks, brush handles and bobbins. Here are slate and stone quarries. The surrounding country is very mountainous and abounds with iron, sulphur and copper ore. The soil is a kind of hard gravel, locally called pinnel; subsoil, slate. The land is chiefly taken up with grazing. The acreage is 7,298; rateable value, £9,114; the population in 1891 was 1,169.

National Endowed (mixed), built in 1806, & enlarged in 1886, for 151 children, & again in 1893 for additional 32; average attendance, 152; George Henry Parkinson, master

National Endowed at Aulthurstside, 1½ miles from Broughton; (mixed), built about 1820, for 50 children; average attendance, 44; also with an endowment for 14 poor scholars; John Henry Kilburn, master: the endowments for both schools amount to £48 yearly & include one, now (1891) amounting to about £21 yearly; £8 of which is derived from a fund left in 1826 by the late Mrs. Jane Taylor; this benefaction is apportioned as follows:—£8 to Broughton school for the education of 10 poor scholars & £13 to Aulthurstside school for the education of 14 poor scholars: there is a further endowment of £27 yearly, derived from the Mennfield property, £22 being assigned to Broughton & £5 to Aulthurstside school

ANGERTON (formerly extra-parochial) is now a parish, 2 to 3½ miles south from Broughton and 1 to 3½ south-east from Foxfield Junction station on the Furness railway, in the North Lonsdale division of the county, North Lonsdale petty sessional division, Lonsdale hundred (north of the Sands), Ulverston union and county court district. The soil is moss peat and marsh sand: subsoil, clay and sand. The greater part of the land is moor and the remainder being partly arable and pasture. Mrs. Sawrey-Cookson, of Broughton Tower, is lady of the manor; the trustees of the late Major Rawlinson are the principal landowners. The acreage is 2,195, of which 1,121 are water; rateable value, £1,036; the population in 1891 was 28.

MOSS HOUSES, WATTHAM HILL, MARSH FIELD and ANGERTON HALL are places in the parish.

This place is included in Kirkby Ireleth United District School Board; the children attend the Board school at Grizebeck & the Burlington schools, Kirkby Ireleth

KIRKBY IRELETH is an extensive parish 7 miles west from Ulverston and 27 north-west from Lancaster, with a station on the Furness railway, in the North Lonsdale division of the county, North Lonsdale petty sessional division, Lonsdale hundred (north of the Sands), Ulverston union and county court district, rural deanery of Ulverston, archdeaconry of Furness and diocese of Carlisle: the Kirby Pool, or Steers Pool, flows through the parish, which comprises the townships of Kirkby Ireleth, Broughton and Dunnerdale with Scathwaite. Kirkby, for parochial purposes, is divided into four districts, viz. Heathwaite, Woodland, Low Quarter and Middle Quarter, containing the small hamlets of Chapels, Marshside, Wallend, Beckside, Beanthwaite, Grizebeck, Sandside and Soutergate. The church of St. Cuthbert, at Beckside, is an ancient edifice of local slate stone, with dressings of red Permian sandstone, in the Norman and Pointed styles, consisting of chancel, nave, north aisle, south porch and an embattled western tower of late Perpendicular date, partly rebuilt in 1827 and containing 5 bells, all dated 1831: the south doorway is a good specimen of the late Norman style, which prevailed from 1120 to 1170: there are some ancient monuments to the Kirby family, including one to William Kirby, a knight templar, and another to William Kirby, of Ashlack (1747); some fine examples of old stained glass still remain. The church was thoroughly restored and reseated in 1883 at a cost of £1,800, and will seat 400 persons. The register dates from the year 1681. The living is a vicarage, the rent-charge £24, net yearly value £275, including glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and

Chapter of York, and held since 1879 by the Rev. Charles Henry Lowry M.A. late fellow of Queen's College, Oxford. There is a Baptist chapel in the Middle Quarter and a Wesleyan chapel at Marsh side.

Charities:—The sum of £76 0s. 8d. being the aggregate of various bequests left in 1680-1 by Roger, John and Agnes Kirkby, John Askew and John Woodbourne, together with £72 13s. 4d. of ancient parish stock, from time immemorial administered by the 24 of the parish, was in 1681 laid out in the purchase of an estate or farm called "Hullstrada," in Kirkby Ireleth: the rent thereof now (1894) amounts to £105 yearly, three-elevenths of which is paid to the vicar, and the remainder is divided among the poor and applied to the education of their children: the management being in the hands of the churchwardens and overseers. Thomas Holme, of Northamptonshire, in 1774 left £50 in trust to the minister and churchwardens, the interest to be distributed in bread. Samuel Wilson, of Cop, in this parish, in 1769 left £50 in trust to the churchwardens, the interest of £30 to be applied to education, and the remaining interest to be given to the poor of Middle and Lower Quarters. These two charities, together with £8 belonging to the parish, were in 1791 applied to the purchase of two closes of land in this parish called "Taddas." John Dodgson, of Beanthwaite, who died Feb. 1832, left in trust to the overseers and churchwardens the sum of £300, the interest of one-half for education, and that of the other half to be divided on Christmas day among four poor inhabitants not in receipt of parochial relief. John Postlethwaite, of Ulverston, left by will, dated 1847, £300 to be invested in Eastern County Railway 5 per cent. Stock, the interest, after the death of his uncle Bartholomew Postlethwaite, which occurred in 1872, to be divided on Christmas Day by the minister and churchwardens, among 20 or 30 poor widows who shall have attended church regularly throughout the year. Margaret Postlethwaite, of Yeat House, Woodland, left £200, the interest to be divided by the churchwardens amongst the poor of Heathwaite and Woodland.

This parish is famous for its extensive slate quarries, in a hill called "Kirkby Moor," in Middle Quarter, and the property of Victor Cavendish esq. M.P. of Holker Hall: this ridge apparently consists of an almost inexhaustible mass of dark blue slate of a very durable kind, the quarries extending in succession along the heights to the north of the church; the quarries now (1894) employ about 140 men. The surrounding country is very mountainous and abounds with the usual products of Furness Fell—iron, copper and slate. Kirkby Hall, formerly the seat of the Kirby family, and said to have been the seat of that family for at least ten generations, is now a farm house: the original founder of the mansion is supposed to have been Roger de Kirby, who was lord of Kirkby in the time of Richard I.; but the existing structure, built of red stone, dates from the Tudor period, and includes a singular apartment called the "Chapel," now much dilapidated upon the walls of which are inscribed in black letters, the Lord's prayer, Creed &c. with heraldic devices: there is also a large hall, and other rooms with quaint carved work. The quantity of inclosed land in this parish bears but a small proportion to the moorlands and wastes, but it is in a good state of cultivation. The acreage, including the moorlands, is 9,703, of which 883 are water, chiefly the property of Victor Cavendish esq. M.P. of Holker Hall, who is lord of the manor, but there are several smaller owners. The soil is gravel; subsoil, stone and slate. The land is principally used for pasturage. The population of the township in 1871 was 1,763, and 1,722 in 1881, and in 1891, 1,560. The acreage of the parish is 27,258, viz.: Scathwaite with Dunnerdale, 10,358 acres; Broughton-in-Furness, 7,298; Kirkby Ireleth, with the chapelry of Woodland, 9,702; rateable value of Kirkby Ireleth, £9,062; and the population, 2,993.

SCATHWAITE, about 8 miles north from Broughton-in-Furness, is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in February 1888, out of the parish of Kirkby Ireleth, in the North Lonsdale division of the county, North Lonsdale petty sessional division, Lonsdale hundred, Ulverston union and county court district, rural deanery of Gosforth, archdeaconry of Furness and diocese of Carlisle. The church of the Holy Trinity, erected in 1874 on the foundations of the old edifice, is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a turret on the western gable containing one bell: there are sittings for 100 persons. The register of baptisms and marriages dates from 1737 and burials from 1738, but there are a few earlier entries dating from 1684. The living is a vicarage, average tithes rent-charge £31, net yearly value £130, including 4½ acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of William Millers Rawlinson esq. and held since 1876 by the Rev. Sydney Richard Maynard Walker B.A. of Christ Church, Oxford.

DUNNERDALE WITH SEATHWAITE, on the Duddon, which divides Lancashire from Cumberland, form a township, the former 3 miles north and the latter 6½ north from Broughton-in-Furness and 5 south-west from Conistone Lake station on the Conistone branch of the Furness railway: this township consists of scattered farmhouses, placed at the foot of high hills, which on the Cumberland side are covered with brackenwood, and afford employment in wood-cutting and bark peeling, and on the Lancashire side give support to a few sheep: the scenery of this vale, through which the Duddon flows, is exceedingly beautiful. Turn Beck, a tributary of the Duddon, rises in Seathwaite Tarn, joining the Duddon at Newfield. The Duddon rises near the Shrotones, Wrynose, the point at which the three counties of Lancashire, Cumberland and Westmorland join. There are three small charities, viz.:—a book fund, amounting to a capital sum of £10 10s.; the church music fund, amounting to a capital sum of £50; and another from unknown donors yielding 2s. 6d. annually. William Millers Rawlinson is lord of the manor and lordowner, but the greater part of the township belongs to the resident yeomen. The area is 10,258 acres, of which 61 are water; rateable value, £2,202; the population of Dunnerdale with Seathwaite in 1891 was 374.

National School, James Tyson, master.

Parochial School, built in 1798 & rebuilt in 1854, and endowed with about £14 yearly, derived from funds left in 1841, 1854, 1861 & 1869 by the late Rev. Canon Miller, of Duddon Hall, James Ashburner & Richard Tyson, of this parish & John Tyson, of Liverpool: the endowment is applied to the augmentation of the master's salary; there is room for 60 scholars, but the average attendance is not more than 20; John Holloway, master.

WOODLAND is an ecclesiastical parish, formed July 4th, 1876, and extended July 2, 1880, and now includes the hamlet of Heathwaite with that portion of Higher Broughton lying east of the old highway from Broughton to Conistone, with a station on the Furness railway. The church of St. John the Evangelist, built in 1668 and rebuilt in 1822, was superseded in 1854 by a new church in the Early English style, erected at a cost of about £1,000, and consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a turret on the western gable containing one bell: there are three stained windows erected by the late Rev. Richard Pulgrave Manclark M.A. rector of Anmer, Norfolk, to the memory of his mother and sister: the church affords about 150 sittings. The register of baptisms dates from 1748, of marriages from 1874 and of burials from 1758. The living is a rectory, average tithe rent-charge £17, gross yearly value £214, including 45 acres of glebe, augmented by grants, with residence, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1834 by the Rev. J. Park B.A. The population of Woodland hamlet in 1891 was 76; of the whole ecclesiastical parish, 352.
