BROUGHTON-IN-FURNESS

BROUGHTON-IN-FURNESS (or West Broughton) is a small market town and parish, with a station on the London, Midland and Scottish railway, 270 miles from London, 10 north-west by road from Ulverston and 15 by rail, 11 north from Furness Abbey, 14 north from Barrow-in-Furness, 40 north-west from Lancaster, 85 north from Liverpool and 85 north-west from Manchester; it is in the Lonsdale division of the county, North Lonsdale petty sessional division, Lonsdale hundred (north of the Sands), union, county court district and rural deanery of Ulverston, archdeaconry of Furness and diocese of Carlisle. The town is about three-quarters of a mile east of the river Duddon, which separates this county from Cumberland, and about half a mile from the extreme point of the Duddon Sands, on the slope of a gentle eminence, and has a southern aspect. The Broughton-in-Furness Water Company Limited was incorporated in 1897 to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria; a supply of water of extraordinary purity is now obtained, at a cost of £1,750, from Woodhouse farm, 2 miles distant. The church of St. Mary Magdalene, situated outside the town on the south side, and partly re-erected in 1873, at a cost of £3,071, is an ancient building of stone in the Norman style, incorporating remains of reputed Saxon work, and consists of chancel, nave, south aisle with porch, and a western tower: the font is supposed to have come from Furness Abbey, and is beautifully sculptured: there are twelve stained windows to the Latham, Sawrey-Cookson and Haslinson families, and others to Joseph Barker esq. of Bank End, and to Georgiana, Viscountess Cross C.I. who died 20 Jan. 1907: in the church is a mural monument of black marble, dated 1793, to the Rev. Jeremiah Gilpin, formerly minister of this church: there also remains a beautiful Early Norman doorway: the church will seat 500 persons. The register dates from the year 1662. The living is a perpetual curacy, net yearly value £300, including 3 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1920 by the Rev. Charles William Wakefield M.A. of Trinity College, Oxford. Near the church is a cross, erected in 1921 as a memorial to the men of the parish who lost their lives in the Great War, 1914-18. The church of the Holy Innocents, at DUNNERDALE, in this parish, erected in 1887 at a cost of £600, will seat 140 persons. There is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel, erected in 1875 by Nathaniel Caine esq. A sum of about £20 a year, arising from the rent of a house and cottage in the square, left by Miss Agnes Dixon, and other small sums, are distributed yearly to the poor. Edward Taylor's charity consists of a sum of money left by him for the benefit of the Grammar (now Elementary) school. With this bequest, together with money from the rates, the Meanfield Tenement was purchased; part of the income formerly went to the schools at Broughton and Aulthurstide, but is now accumulating till a scheme for its disposition is adopted. Agnes Dixon's charity consists of a house in the Square, a cottage, and a piece of turbary; one-third of the income goes to Aulthurstide school and two-thirds to the poor. Jane Taylor's, consisting of a sum of £270, is now invested with the official trustee; the income is applied part for the teaching of poor scholars of Aulthurstide and the remainder given to the poor. Jane Bamesey's, consisting of £100, is applied to the maintenance of the poor. There are also various other charities, producing interest of £200, of which 15s. is given to the preacher of a sermon on New Year's Day; the remainder is divided between the schools and the poor. Isaac Danson (d. 1913) left £1,000 in trust, the income for the benefit of the sick and poor. In the Market place, in the centre of the town, is an obelisk, standing on a square base, and erected in the year 1810, the 60th year of the reign of George III. In 1215 a charter was granted by Henry III. for a weekly market. A weekly market is held on Tuesday and

auction sales of cattle on alternate Tuesdays, and three annual fairs April 27th, August 1st and October 6th, principally for horned cattle and mountain sheep. The Manor court is held every August. The scenery throughout the vale of Duddon (celebrated by the poet Wordsworth) is very beautiful. At Brathwaite Fells, 4 miles east, are cairns and some Early British remains. Broughton Tower is the property and residence of Capt. Robert Haukin, who is lord of the manor and the chief landowner; it is a spacious mansion, delightfully situated on an eminence, and commands extensive views of the sea and the neighbouring mountains; the central portion of the mansion is ancient, but the wings were added in 1882-3 by James Sawrey-Cookson esq.; in the 15th century it was held by Sir Thomas Broughton, made a knight banneret in 1462; some of the walls are quite 6ft. in thickness, and in the old part of the tower is a narrow stone spiral staircase of 92 steps. Eccle Riggs, the seat of Viscount Cross, is a well-built stone mansion, affording extensive views of the fine scenery in this locality. The vicinity abounds in woods, consisting of ash, oak, birch, beech, hazel and alder, periodically furnishing material for conversion into hoops, brush stocks, brush handles and bobbins. Mrs. Sawrey-Cookson, Viscount Cross and the trustees of the Rev. John Postlethwaite M.A. Inc. of Coatham 1853-65, d. 1886, are the principal landowners. The surrounding country is very mountainous and abounds with iron, sulphur and copper ore. The soil is a kind of hard gravel, locally called pinnet; subsoil, slate. The land is chiefly taken up with grazing. The area of West Broughton township is 6,922 acres of land, 21 of water, 37 of tidal water and 67 of foreshore; rateable value, £12,012; the population in 1921 was 1,336, and of Broughton-in-Furness ecclesiastical parish in 1911, 1,113.
